Counting Down...or Counting Up

Counting down to important events may be a universal human tendency. **Three weeks** until my birthday.... **Six days** until vacation... **Two hours** before the school/work day is over... In contrast, this month Judaism offers Sefirat HaOmer, a chance to count *up* as we approach the holiday of Shavuot. On the second day of Pesach we begin to count: seven weeks plus a day—fifty days. This commemorates the start of the barley harvest in biblical times, and serves to connect the liberation from Egypt of Passover with the giving of the Torah on Shavuot. There are many customs associated with this time period. The idea of preparation and purification for receiving Torah are central.

For those with a more mystical bent, each of the seven weeks are associated with one of seven qualities and each of the seven days of the week are also associated with one of the qualities, leading to 49 permutations of qualities to consider. This is a huge oversimplification of the concept, I recommend http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Counting_of_the_Omer as a good place to start if this idea intrigues you.

But still, why count up and not down? It may seem like a trivial difference, but I don't think it is. The discussion occurs in conjunction with the Hanukkah candles as well. Rabbi Shammai says that we start with eight lights and count down. Rabbi Hillel maintains that we start with one light and count up. Hillel won that debate (actually, he wins most of them) with the explanation that in matters of holiness we should increase and not decrease. And so, as we move toward Shavuot our awareness and our dedication should increase. Furthermore, we need to maintain that awareness throughout the counting—each day matters!

It's a profound lesson, especially when facing big challenges. Each day is one step towards the goal. Each step counts. And there are some things that you just can't rush. No matter how eager we are to receive Torah, we can't jump ahead to Sinai. We have to travel through the entire 49 days first. May we all take heart from the words of the Psalmist: teach us to count our days rightly that we may obtain a wise heart. (Psalms 90:12)

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Aaron Sherman

It's hard to believe that this is my final message to you all as President of Temple Shir Shalom! As I often have over the last two years, I feel like there is still so much left to do. How can I possibly walk away knowing that the job isn't complete? It's always at this point that I recall Rabbi Tarfon's words from Pirkei Avot. "You are not required to complete the task, yet you are not free to withdraw from it." I used this as a mantra over the last two years when I felt overwhelmed by the job. There is no end to the task of leading a synagogue. After serving on the Board for 7 years, there are still things that I continue to work on, but haven't finished. I've seen many changes at Temple Shir Shalom; always with the intent of making our community stronger.

We're going to continue to see changes next year, and not just in the people in positions of leadership. Temple Shir Shalom must continue to look for what works for us and not be afraid to leap into the new. I let you know in March that the Board was in discussions with Temple Israel about a common religious school between our synagogues. Those conversations have gone very well over the last two months. Cantor Kim and Rabbi Neely of Temple Israel have built a curriculum that supports the needs of both Temple Shir Shalom and Temple Israel students. Dale Mester has led the business side of discussions for us and worked with the leaders of Temple Israel to lay out a financial plan for a self-sustaining joint religious school. She and Cantor Kim also made sure there was a place for any of our teachers who wanted to remain a teacher. Our children will study and learn in an environment that immerses them in Jewish life. It's terrifying and exciting, yet I have complete confidence that it will be a fantastic success. We're going to make sure they know that we're doing this, that it works, and that our kids love it!

As a congregation, we must continue to seek out the terrifying changes. It's easy to come up with reasons why we should keep doing what we've been doing, but it's only through willingness to look at something different that we can keep our synagogue vibrant and relevant to today's life. The Religious School is just one example of how thinking differently about our situation can lead to a positive outcome. Many of us who serve

on the Board have held a shared vision for Temple Shir Shalom. A joint religious school wasn't a part of anyone's vision, but here we are. We must keep looking for the solutions that fits best with Temple Shir Shalom and world around us. The world changes and we need to change with it. I've had many conversations with members of the Board this year that deal with thinking outside the box. I know that the Board will continue to look for more outside the box solutions to help Temple Shir Shalom.

Some of you have heard that my family is planning a move in the very near future (we're only moving a few miles). As I was cleaning and boxing some things, I came across some paperwork from an old Board retreat. It was the title page from a section on leading a congregation and it said: "For the task is too heavy for you; you cannot do it alone." Having completed my term (almost), I can emphatically agree (as will likely every Past President of a congregation. Some will say I tried to do too much on my own, and they are probably right, but there is far more that I had help with than not, and I am grateful to all the members of the TSS Board the last two years, the non-Board volunteers who help at TSS, whether through organization, labor or both, Beth Schafer, Cantor Kim Singer and to all of you, even those who simply said "thanks." Most importantly, I could not have done this without Jennifer, Seth and Michelle. There are not enough words to express my gratitude for your support these past two years.

I have one last action as President of the Congregation, and that is to preside over the Annual Meeting. Please plan on attending at 4:00 pm on May 15th. We have important congregational business planned. We have a new leadership team ready to continue the work of strengthening and growing our congregation. I am ready to support them and help them with their vision for Temple Shir Shalom through the next year. I look forward to seeing you all on the 15th!


