FROM THE BIMA Cantor Kim Singer

What brings you joy? What gives you a sense of peace? Of relaxation? If I were to really gather your answers, I suspect there would be a wide range. Even possibly, another oddball like me who finds a great sense of relaxation in the front seat of a really big roller coaster. (I know, it's a bit odd.) Our tastes in food, or music, are probably also wildly different. And really—as much as I love ice cream, I would hate to have that as my only meal option! Our preferences for worship vary as well, from person to person, and even from week to week. What seems medatative on one particular evening may seem to drag on another.

Over the course of the year we'll be trying some new things in terms of Shabbat services. Jewish liturgy is always a balance between keva and kavana, the set liturgy and the fresh perspectives we can bring to it. Over time, the kavana, the innovations of one generation, become the keva, the fixed "way of doing things" for the next. But don't worry! We're not getting rid of everything you love and find familiar and comforting in worship!

Beginning this month, one Friday night each month (usually the second Friday) will be Shir Ruach. This will be an energetic service appropriate for all ages, but hopefully with an added appeal to our younger worshippers. These services will feature upbeat music and stories rather than sermons—often featuring our "puppet in residence Kimbu." Our religious school classes will sometimes be helping to lead the prayers. We will also be including a Torah reading. This lets our students experience a Torah service, so that it is more familiar as Bar/Bat Mitzvah approaches, lets the entire congregation hear Torah being read on a regular basis, and helps to keep our Torah scrolls in good shape! Just like us humans, the Torahs need a little movement to stay healthy.

Another experiment that I'm really excited about: if you play a musical instrument, this is for you! Shabbat Jam! On Friday December 4, please bring whatever instrument you play, and we'll have an extra -musical Shabbat. I will have music—in fact, I'd be delighted to send you the music in advance if you'd like to practice. Tell me what instrument and I'll get you the songs in the correct clef and key. If you don't play an instrument, no worries—we need people to sing the

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Aaron Sherman

This week is the URJ Biennial! It feels like we've been waiting forever for November 2015 and the Biennial to arrive. With the Biennial in Orlando and so close to our home, I wish that everyone could attend, but I know that won't happen this year. We do have enough participants at the Biennial that Temple Shir Shalom achieved a Platinum delegation status! This will be my first participation at a Biennial and my first participation in a regional or national Jewish event. I'm not 100% sure of what to expect, but I'm looking forward to a great information exchange with URJ and other congregational leaders on how to be better leaders within our own congregations.

One of the reasons I decided that attending the Biennial was important to me was because of the opportunity it provided to participate in something exclusively Jewish on a massive scale. I've never been to Israel, didn't go to a Jewish camp as a youth, and I grew up in small communities in the Midwest, so the biggest shared Jewish experience I've had is a High Holiday service. This will by far be the biggest Jewish event that I have ever participated in. All of the stories I have heard shared about Biennial experience reference the feelings created as a result of participating in an event of this scale.

EDUCATION INFORMATION

We've had a great beginning to the school year, with apples and honey, edible sukkot and great learning taking place in all our classrooms. Thanks to our excellent faculty and wonderful madrichim for your commitment to our students and their Jewish education.

Here is a quick taste of what's been going on in our classes:

K-2 students spent the first few weeks focusing on the high holidays, family traditions, tzedaka, and Shabbat rituals. Hebrew letters are brought to life in a multi-sensory approach that includes verbal and kinesthetic element—a high point each week is forming the letters with our bodies! By the end of the year each child will take home a photo booklet showing their hard work learning the Hebrew alphabet. Students also participate in the regular Mitkadem program to learn decoding. Classes include activities such as crafts, games, and dancing in order to learn about our Jewish heritage.

Our 3rd and 4th Graders have been busy studying different aspects of Israel and how we, as Jews, are connected to/ strive for a connection to Israel. They are also learning how the Holidays are celebrated in Israel. (Everyone thought it was great that on Yom Kippur in Israel, you can ride your bike and take walks in the middle of the street!) We have also started studying the Prophets, specifically those who make an appearance after the Torah. So far, we have been introduced to Jonah, Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Joshua. And last but certainly not least, we are also studying Mitzvot. With 613 to choose from, we are concentrating on those connected to the Holidays and those that we can perform in our daily lives. We are also connecting these subjects by considering the Prophets we study and the Mitzvot that they perform. For example, Jonah performed Teshuvah (returning to his best self) in order to get out of the fish. A big part of our exploration revolves around questions and discussions. This group is full of probing questions and

insightful responses!

Fifth and sixth graders are exploring the history of the Jewish People. So far we have studied: living in the early Diaspora, maintaining Jewish traditions living in different cultures, holding on to hope while away from home (with Amos and Isaiah as examples) and the returning to, rebuilding, and rebirth of Jerusalem. In our study of Jewish Ethics we focused on the question of kindness to animals – how does our treatment of our pets reflect our Jewish heritage?

The 7th grade class has been off to a great start. Already, the 7th graders have explored their Jewish values, taken a field trip to UCF Hillel to learn about how to stay involved in the Jewish community after becoming a Bar or Bat Mitzvah, and discussed Jewish views of service by analyzing Maimonides eight levels of charity and applied them to the ways we give to others. Students have already pointed out, many of the questions we address in class about Jewish values do not have one right answer. They are learning that as Jews, we may share a similar set of social and religious values, but our beliefs of right and wrong may be slightly different based upon our personal values.

Our Hebrew program is moving along well. Under the guidance of Morah Debbie House and all the wonderful teens of our Madrich Corps, students are working at their individual levels. K-1st graders are working on learning Alef-Bet and vowels, 2nd graders are learning brachot (blessings), Students in grades 3-4 studying blessings and Sh'ma/V'ahavta., while grades 5-6 are working on either Sh'ma,/V'ahavta or Avot v'lmahot. Our B'nai mitzvah class is working on prayers for their Bar/Bat Mitzvah services as well as working on lessons for Avot V'lmahot. As the year goes on students will continue to master the prayers at their own pace.
